A Word from the Pastor:

"White people in North America live in a society that is deeply separate and unequal by race, and white people are the beneficiaries of that separation and inequality. As a result we are insulated from racial stress, at the same time that we come to feel entitled to and deserving of our advantage. Given how seldom we experience racial discomfort in a society we dominate, we haven't had to build our racial stamina.

Socialized into a deeply internalized sense of superiority that we either are unaware of or can never admit to ourselves, we become highly fragile in conversations about race. We consider a challenge to our racial worldviews as a challenge to our very identities as good, moral people."

These are the first few sentences of the book that Bishop Farr has asked us to read together. I, for one, resonate uncomfortably with it. It touches, almost gently (not quite), on my white angst.

I have tried to be kind and respectful to all people, of every stripe. I am deeply offended by my shared cultural heritage of slavery, and the subsequent abuses, both visible and invisible, that have been perpetuated in our country to keep our black and brown brothers and sisters in an inferior status.

So how am I to blame for the racism that exists today?

I don't know exactly...but I'm willing to find out. Willing to look inside of my heart and my head. Willing to let the light of truth illuminate that which is not of God, but still stubbornly has a foothold inside of me.

I am willing to embark on journey of self-discovery. I hope you will go with me.

Our unit of United Methodist Women has volunteered to provide lunches for the homeless young people who are clients of Epworth's Drop-In Center in North County. This service was being provided with volunteers cooking on-site before the pandemic. Epworth has come up with an alternate way to provide lunches. Currently, NAACP is providing lunches on Tuesday & Thursday. Our goal is to provide lunches the other three weekdays *through the month of June*. After that, we hope other churches in our district will assist with this project.

We invite anyone who would like to contribute to this project. You do not need to be an active participant of UMW. Here are the ways you can help:

- Make sandwiches (15 ham/cheese & 15 turkey/cheese), in fold-over sandwich bags (meat, cheese, and bread can be provided for you, if you prefer)
- Bake 60 cookies, 2 cookies each in 30 sandwich bags
- Donate money to help pay for fruit & bottles of water

- Deliver lunches to the center at 7520 Natural Bridge Rd. (just east of UMSL campus) between 11:00—11:30 a.m.
- Pray for this ministry and the young people involved

Here's how you can help.

(1) You can volunteer to be part of a team of 2 people staffing a drop-off donation table in our church parking lot each Monday and Wednesday in June, beginning June 1, 11 AM -1PM. We ask each volunteer to wear a mask, and there will be a supply at the table of disposable gloves, hand sanitizer, disinfectant wipes, and

disinfectant spray. We will store the donations in Fellowship Hall after each day's collection and drop them off at the WRHM in-take site on selected Fridays in June.

(2) You can <u>donate</u> urgently needed items to our donation site any of those days in June, or place them in Fellowship Hall if you can't make a drop-off day.

Kirkwood's Peace March Organized by Teachers of Color, article via KSDK.com

Kirkwood, MO

Thousands gathered in Kirkwood Saturday morning blocking off streets and marching for peace. Organizers say this was the first march put together by teachers and the turnout was more than they ever imagined.

Before they chanted "black lives matter", there was a silence. 8 minutes and 46 seconds in honor of the time George Floyd spent under an officer's knee.



"I want everyone to think about how long that is as you are walking and not saying anything," assistant principal Ramona Miller, one of the organizers said.

Their message was loud and clear as they went from North Kirkwood Middle School to Kirkwood High School.



"I never seen anything like it in 64 years. It almost made me cry," one protester said.

The signs in the air encouraged people to read between the lines

"What does that mean to you? It means that if you stay silent you're encouraging white lives to continue to be put above black lives," another protester said.

5 On Your Side walked along as protesters marched a mile. The group was made up of all races, all ages and all classes, united to support one cause.

"This is such a huge crowd and I feel good knowing that other people that aren't black are out here supporting the cause," Protester Tajah Foster said. Walker had marched for justice in St. Charles, and now in Kirkwood. "I can only hope that the same people that are out here are the same people that will go to their friends and their families and stand up to them when they see them doing something that feeds into the system," Foster said.

The organizers, who teach for a living, wanted to give a lesson in life today, that their students wouldn't forget.



"No one is immune to racism. We know that, and our students need to know that. They live it every day and they are a part of history. They are living this," Miller said.
