

#### A Word from the Pastor:

Signs, signs, everywhere signs!

NO PEACE-NO JUSTICE
WHITE SILENCE=WHITE VIOLENCE
WE SEE YOU! WE HEAR YOU!
BLACK LIVES MATTER
BLACK CHILDREN MATTER
LOVE ISN'T CANCELLED
SILENCE IS VIOLENCE

Signs were everywhere present in the ginormous crowd (estimates range from 1500-2000) marching to the WGSD Administration building last Sunday in a peaceful protest against racism in our school system for teachers and students. Joel and I didn't hold a sign, but we got the message. Words are powerful. Doubled with action, words can change things.

The remarkably diverse crowd, wrapped in masks representing of all skin colors, gathered first at Ivory Crockett to hear from a number of inspirational speakers.

One was Marty K. Casey, a 1989 WGHS graduate and actress-turned-activist, who told part of her story. She was just a little black girl sitting on the floor with her group at school when a white teacher stepped on her fingers. Little Marty cried out, and holding her bruised fingers asked the teacher if she was going to say "I'm



sorry?" The teacher said, "Maybe you shouldn't have had your hand there." Marty's next response got her in trouble with the school administrator. She was suspended for 90 days from school.

Her mom moved the family to Webster Groves. To fit in, and cope with her anger, Marty became the class clown. One day, a high school teacher pulled her aside and told her how much she admired Marty's intelligence and passion. She said, "You are really smart and gifted. You are going to do something in this world. But not unless you change your attitude."

Marty became more focused and determined to be heard and taken seriously. She ultimately became the first black representative from our area who served as an ambassador at the United Nations.


She stayed connected with that teacher, who continued to encourage her and offer her wisdom and support. That teacher was white.

That WG teacher became part of a village of support to this young, angry black girl. We can all do that. We should all do that. Who can you encourage and support with your words of wisdom and acts of encouragement?

Words + action are powerful. They can change things.

The conversation about race should not limited to adults. Bringing children into calm, educated discussions can help a younger generation confront the reality of racism and be part of the solution in ending racial injustice.

The following books were recommended by our friends at the <u>General</u> Commission on Race and Religion.



"The Snowy Day"

One of a series, this book by Ezra Jack Keats, features a black boy who experiences the joy of a snowy day in his city. First published in 1962, the book is lauded for breaking the color barrier for mainstream children's literature. Other titles in the series are "A Letter to Amy," "Hi, Cat!," and "Whistle for Willie." (Recommended for ages birth to 3 years old.)



<u>"Hair Love"</u>

The book that inspired an Oscar-winning short film, "Hair Love" tells the sweet story of author Matthew A. Cherry, a black father, learning to do his daughter's hair for the first time. (Recommended for ages 3 to 5.)



"The Youngest Marcher"

Cynthia Levinson tells the true and shocking story of 9-year-old Audrey Faye Hendricks, who, in 1963, was jailed for a week along with hundreds of other children following a Birmingham civil rights march. (Recommended for ages 5-8.)

# Lunches of Love for Epworth Drop-In Center Hands-On Mission with United Methodist Women

Our unit of United Methodist Women has volunteered to provide lunches for the homeless young people who are clients of Epworth's Drop-In Center in North County. This service was being provided with volunteers cooking on-site before the pandemic. Epworth has come up with an alternate way to provide lunches. Currently, NAACP is providing lunches on Tuesday & Thursday. Our goal is to provide lunches the other three weekdays *through the month of June*. After that, we hope other churches in our district will assist with this project.

We invite anyone who would like to contribute to this project. You do not need to be an active participant of UMW. Here are the ways you can help:

- Make sandwiches (15 ham/cheese & 15 turkey/cheese), in fold-over sandwich bags (meat, cheese, and bread can be provided for you, if you prefer)
- Bake 60 cookies, 2 cookies each in 30 sandwich bags
- Donate money to help pay for fruit & bottles of water
- Deliver lunches to the center at 7520 Natural Bridge Rd. (just east of UMSL campus) between 11:00—11:30 a.m.
- Pray for this ministry and the young people involved

<u>Monetary donations may be mailed to Lettie Morse</u> or dropped off in the church office. Checks should be made to **United Methodist Women**, with *Epworth Drop-In Center* on the memo line.

If you prefer to donate online, select Epworth Children & Family Service and type in the memo line *UMW Lunches*.

If you would like to volunteer to help with this project, Carolyn Redmore will be organizing & scheduling volunteers. Contact her via phone or text at 314-249-8215. Please wait for Carolyn to confirm the date before you make sandwiches or bake cookies. Also, there are specific directions for sandwich prep and packing that will be given to you after you volunteer.

Here's how you can help.

(1) You can <u>volunteer</u> to be part of a team of 2 people staffing a drop-off donation table in our church parking lot each Monday and Wednesday in June, beginning June 1, 11 AM -1PM. We ask each volunteer to wear a mask, and there will be a supply at the table of disposable gloves, hand sanitizer, disinfectant wipes, and

disinfectant spray. We will store the donations in Fellowship Hall after each day's collection and drop them off at the WRHM in-take site on selected Fridays in June.

(2) You can <u>donate</u> urgently needed items to our donation site any of those days in June, or place them in Fellowship Hall if you can't make a drop-off day.

Currently the list of needs is the following, but it is subject to change if needs change:

- Toilet paper
- Hand soap and hand sanitizer

- dry food items (beans, rice, cereal, etc.)


Claire and I also plan to go to Dollar Tree this week to donate to the Food and Hygiene drive. Thank you for all that you do!
