#### ...a message from Pastor Sharon

The Perfect Storm

If I were to describe the perfect combination to produce a potent mix of fear, anxiety, and violence, we might just read newspaper headlines from this summer.

COVID-19 numbers are on the rise, yet another shooting of an unarmed black man brings masses of civil unrest out in protest, incidents of domestic violence have sharply risen, fire, hurricane and tornado victims abound, small businesses are collapsing left and right, there's been a shooting death of a St. Louis police offer, and students and teachers are struggling with on-line teaching/learning while parents try to figure out how to return to work. All this is upon us as we move into an extraordinarily contentious political season.

It feels like a perfect storm.

Where do we turn in a storm? How do we protect ourselves?

That is probably what the disciples were wondering when a storm was raging about them and the waves threatened to swamp their boat on the Sea of Galilee. You might remember the story from the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke:

<sup>24</sup> Suddenly a furious storm came up on the lake, so that the waves swept over the boat. But Jesus was sleeping.<sup>25</sup> The disciples went and woke him, saying, "Lord, save us! We're going to drown!"<sup>26</sup> He replied, "You of little faith, why are you so afraid?" Then he got up and rebuked the winds and the waves, and it was completely calm. <sup>27</sup> The men were amazed and asked, "What kind of man is this? Even the winds and the waves obey him!" -Matthew 8:24-27

Storms can be frightening. They can also be very dangerous. This ancient story brings us our help in times of upheaval. Scripture tells us to trust in God. That it is only in God that we will find real peace, even in the midst of the most horrible confluence of storms. It is just that simple. And just that difficult.

"God is love" proclaims the Bible (1 John 4:8). And love triumphs over evil. Love triumphs over hate. And love triumphs over fear. God's love enveloping us, and then being carried by each one of us into our communities, can still the waters of the storms facing us. Love is our life preserver. Hang on.

## **Epworth Children and Family Services - Food Pantry**

As many of you know Epworth serves children, youth and families in the St. Louis area and is associated with the United Methodist Church as one of our National Mission Institutes. The population they serve includes youth in our community who are homeless or at risk and the agency does so in a variety of ways including residential housing, emergency shelters, and outreach to homeless youth.

Epworth continues to be very grateful for our church's financial donations, meals, and other items given so that they can feed and care for their clients. Something that was expanded because of the pandemic and at the request of the NAACP was the food pantry at the Normandy location. Previously, it provided food for the youth who came to the Drop-In Center but the needs in the community have become so great that the expansion was very important. They are in need of any of the typical pantry items such as canned fruits and vegetables, cereals, canned meats or other protein items, pasta or rice type food, etc. Another need is bottled water.
