

#### WHERE Shall We Worship?

As we move into the fall season of this most "unusual year", the temperatures are dropping. I see more sweatshirts and sweaters at our Thursday evening Mountain Service out on the parking lot. Still it is lovely weather to be together for worship. But soon, the weather will not be as hospitable to people or instruments.

This past Sunday, Pastor Josh offered the Church Council three alternatives for when that time comes:

- 1. Return to broadcasting from his home, thereby eliminating the opportunity to come together for in-person worship each week.
- 2. Invest in propane heaters (like the kind found in outside restaurant spaces) to be used to increase the level of comfort for outside worship through the winter months.
- 3. Move the worship service into the building.

The Church Council debated the attributes and concerns of each option, and agreed to allow The Mountain Service to move to the Sanctuary, as the space is vastly larger and the risk of virus transmission less than in Fellowship Hall. All worshippers must wear masks, and cluster in family groups, at least 6 feet from one another and 25-30 feet from the band. Pastor Josh will make the determination of when it is time to move the service inside.

If we are willing to bring The Mountain Service back inside the building, you might ask, then why can't we hold in-person worship there on Sunday mornings as well? That's a fair question.

The issue is dependent upon two things: the number of worship participants and the County Positivity Rate. First, the number of participants. While we typically have 20-30 attendees at The Mountain Service, we average 110-120 at our Sunday Services. Currently, by mandate of the St. Louis County Executive, churches are subject to capacity limitations of 25%, or in our case, about 100 persons. That means we could be at maximum capacity immediately, and possibly beyond as soon as we opened back up. It would be necessary to take reservations, or expect to be turning people away. This is all doable, except for the issue of the Positivity Rate. The Positivity Rate represents the percentage of those tested who are actually infected. The St. Louis County Positivity Rate is still in double digits, and this is considered high. Until it falls much lower and that drop is sustained, our Safety Team, affirmed by our Church Council, believes it is still too risky to be gathering a large group in the building.

Friends, I know many of us long to gather again in worship. However, it is our Wesleyan mandate to "do not harm". Until the risks fall for virus transmission in our county, I invite you join me on Facebook on Sunday mornings at 10:30a (the service remains available later on fb and on our website) and/or Thursday evenings at The Mountain Service. Being together there is wonderful!

My invitation to you is to participate in worship, one way or another. I'll see you there, wherever it is.

#### World Communion Sunday on October 4 Provides Scholarships Around the World

Sara Bless C. Sanchez is a scholarship recipient from the Philippines . Here is a bit of her story:

Ms. Sanchez recalls, "My teenage years were memorable and at the same time challenging. I experienced bullying and sometimes I felt I didn't belong with my classmates. I am thankful that my parents encouraged me to get involved in church activities." Sanchez served as the UMYF officer in her home church in Nueva Vizcaya, Philippines, became a Sunday school teacher, Bible study leader, and dance ministry leader. She helped to organize youth activities at the local church and annual conference level.

During college, Sanchez took a psychology course and fell in love with the discipline. She recognized how valuable a ministry in psychology could be to her country. "There are a lot of mental health issues arising," she explained. When a friend informed her about the World Communion Sunday scholarship, she applied and was awarded the Leadership scholarship.

Sanchez went on to say that, "Receiving the scholarship has taught me never to doubt what God can do. Because of the scholarship, I am more excited and motivated to do mental health ministry. I am confident because I know God is with me in this journey." She is presently pursuing a doctorate in Clinical Psychology at Far Eastern University in the Philippines.

The special offering provides World Communion Scholarships, the Ethnic Scholarship Program, and the Ethnic-In-Service Training Program. #### What About Lord's Acre in 2020?

As we all know, this year---since March at least---has been a time like no other we've experienced. Since so many activities of our lives have been shut down, including our own in-person Sunday worship---our usual routines are at something of a stand-still, an enforced rest, if you will. But, maybe if we look on the positive side, we can use this time to rest and reflect, to refuel and rejuvenate. Actually, that idea is Biblical. **Exodus 23:11 calls on the people to let the land they farm** *"rest and be fallow, so that the needy of your people may eat."* Fallowing soil has been used for centuries in many parts of the world as a method of sustainable land management, and more recently it has been used in Canada & the Southwestern United States too. So it is this year with our church's long tradition of sharing our Lord's Acre together. We can't keep everyone safe if we eat together and compete for auction items and services. But we must be creative because *"the needy of your people"* still need our support.

But, the Risk-Taking Mission Team has a plan for still carrying out our mission goals to support our Mozambique covenant church with \$1400 and our beloved local agencies with some amount of help to them in this difficult year for all non-profits.

Our plan is to have a non-event fundraiser. <u>We are asking families/individuals---</u> <u>between Nov. 8 & Nov. 21---to contribute to our Lord's Acre fund the amount you</u> <u>would have spent at this year's dinner and auction, or what you spent last year,</u> <u>or to consider contributing for the first time if you've never participated.</u> We'll have some incentive rewards in the form of homemade pies for our higher donors and thank-you goodies for everyone who contributes something. I know some of you enjoy making lovely things each year for Lord's Acre, so if anyone wants to give us handcrafted items that you **price**, we would love to award them to donors giving that amount. We also hope to have a drawing for a large prize to enter for those top givers, with a minimum to be determined soon.

#### **Special WUM Offering for US Weather Disasters**

**The news is bad for people, trees, and wildlife** in Oregon and California. Wildfires are sweeping out of control through thousands and thousands of acres of forest, consuming the homes of all living things. The skies are grey with smoke. But the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) has already begun to respond.

Last month, Hurricane Laura ravaged coastal communities in the path of the storm's heavy winds and rain in Louisiana and Texas. Last week, Hurricane Sally smashed into the coasts of Florida and Alabama.
