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A Message from Our Pastor



"OUR CONNECTIONAL STORY KEEPS UNFOLDING..."

FIRST, THE ORGANIZATION (skip down three paragraphs if you know HOW we are organized): The United Methodist Church is organized as a global connectional system. That means that all United Methodist Churches are sister churches, like outposts, belonging to one central organization: THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH. Every four years, representatives from all over the world gather and make decisions about our doctrine and practices. We call that General Conference (GC).

Also, every four years, Jurisdictional Conference (JC) meets to elect new bishops and appoint them to their conferences. Pastor Josh Krakos serves as one of the Missouri delegates to JC.

In the United States, the church is further subdivided into 59 geographical conferences. Our church is part of the Missouri Conference, and once a year, all clergy and lay representatives sent by each church gather to refresh our connection, learn about what we are doing all over the world, the country, and the state, and make decisions about programming, spending, and new candidates for ministry. We call this our Annual Conference (AC). This year we will meet in Branson from May 10–12, and Missouri Bishop Robert Farr will preside.

BECAUSE OF SAFETY CONCERNS, the 2020 General Conference has been postponed twice. It's not hard to imagine how difficult it is to gather together 600–1000 clergy and lay delegates from around the world during a pandemic and maintain their safety. We have just received the news that GC has been postponed a third time, to 2024, due to the long processing times for the necessary visas.

This was to be a pivotal global gathering for our denomination, as our delegates would be voting about the future unity of our connection. After decades of intensifying debate and defiance of church bans on same-sex weddings and "self-avowed practicing" gay clergy, we have come to realize that staying united as a global connection might be more hurtful than breaking apart. The next General Conference (whenever that will be) will face multiple proposals for denominational separation; the most endorsed of these is the Protocol of Reconciliation & Grace Through Separation, which if adopted, would allow churches and conferences that support bans on gay weddings and ordination to leave with church property and \$25 million in United Methodist funds to form a new "traditionalist" denomination.

That new denomination, already organized and named the Global Methodist Church, (assuming the "Protocol of Reconciliation" would have been passed at the 2022 GC), had planned to launch in conjunction with General Conference later this year. However, based on this latest postponement, the new denomination's Transitional Leadership Team has announced plans to move the launch date up to May 1, 2022, even before the GC has voted on any plan of separation.

I know this sounds like so much gobbledygook. In short, it's about how our connection relates and serves the world at a global level. But changes to that connection may have an impact at the local church level for those churches (or individuals) who, because of deeply held traditional views, wish to disaffiliate from our United Methodist connection.

For me, it is important to keep in mind this one main thing: no matter how our connection changes over time, Webster United Methodist is a church family, and we are dedicated to loving, growing, and serving in the name of Jesus Christ. As a diverse faith family, and one who radically welcomes all people to Christ's table of grace, we will continue to love each other, grow in God's grace, and serve one another and our neighbor.

That is who we are. That is who we will continue to be.

MORE FOLLOW UP: TRUTH IN EDUCATION ADVOCACY WITH THE MISSOURI LEGISLATURE

While temperatures were not as cold as they were for the February 19 rally at U. City High School, we had to be up very early for the drive to Jeff City for a morning of advocacy with legislators. The "we" was about 20 folks from MCU (Metropolitan Congregations United), divided into five teams advocating for or against legislation in four areas. I was part of the Break the [School to Prison] Pipeline Team, though began the morning joining two Truth in Education teams. We met with the House Majority Floor Leader Rep. Dean Plocher to present the position letter circulated at the rally advocating against HB 1995, restricting what can be taught, and HB 1474, on parental rights with the right to sue. Rep. Plocher manages bills coming to the House floor for a vote. He said: "There's a reason [these two bills] have not come to the floor," though at some point he used the word "intentional." When the bills go to the House floor, he anticipates "a not pretty day" of debate, passage, but failure in the Senate. He does not support the bills as filed, though he thinks transparency "might be a good thing."

The Break the Pipeline Team focused on advocating for the passage of HB 2533 which prohibits out-of-school suspension of K-3rd grade students and requires documentation and reporting of disciplinary practices. The outlook there is more hopeful. Though the bill is still "in committee" a hearing with strong testimony from parents and teachers for the bill has been held. Cautious expectation from Rep. Ian Mackey is that the bill will go to the

House floor and receive a positive vote. In the Senate, however, it is likely to face more obstacles.

I have learned that "advocacy" is never a "one and done" matter. Rep. Mackey's aide, Adam Speak, has agreed to keep me posted on the progress of the above bills and key legislators to communicate with at strategic points. **You can be an advocate too** by emailing and calling your representatives in the legislature. First step: know who your Representative and Senator are. Second step: Watch/read local news for reports on the legislation. Third step: email me for updates on the above bills. Fourth step: Take action. My go-to scripture: "He has told you human one what is good and what the Lord requires of you: to do justice, embrace faithful love, and walk humbly with your God" Micah 6:8 (CEB).
