

A Message from Our Pastor

"PLEASE DON'T CALL ME THAT"

The recent news leak that *Roe vs. Wade* may be overturned soon by the Supreme Court of the United States has unleashed yet another intensely divisive and passionate fracas amongst Americans of good faith. I, like perhaps many of you, have been struggling to put my thoughts into words. Here's my best effort at this moment.

I believe that every person should have a right to determine what happens to their own body, including whether they carry a pregnancy through to term, or not. Scripture says, "Thus says God the Lord, Who created the heavens and stretched them out, Who spread out the earth and its offspring, Who gives breath to the people on it. And spirit to those who walk in it" (Isaiah 42:5). God the Creator gave us life and spirit, thereby imbuing us with our selfhood and therefore choice. But please don't call me Pro-Choice.

I also believe that every child is precious, including the unborn. Scripture says, "For you formed my inward parts; you knitted me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made" (Psalm 139:13). But please don't call me Pro-Life.

It seems to me that the decision to terminate a life growing inside your own body is one that is so intensely personal that it must not be mandated or denied by the government. When does that life begin? When a tree is still an acorn, it is not called a tree yet. When a child is still a collection of fetal cells, is it a child? If not, then when are there enough elements of life to call it a child? I do not have that wisdom. Yet, we value every new life as precious in the sight of God's eyes. For me, this issue is not of a singular dimension, black or white, right or wrong. Instead, it is a prism, with many facets to consider, each one throwing a different light on the matter. Sadly, every side is limited in its view and refracts the light to its own ends.

With issues like this one, I turn to my faith to help me. The United Methodist Social Principles have a set of guidelines that help illuminate what God is already doing in our lives. While they are not RULES, they are described as "clearly marked signposts on our journey toward living fully into God's gracious love for the world." They offer guidance and illumination in our current context. They are written by the elected representatives from every United Methodist Conference who, every four years, do the work of General Conference. They do not come down like tablets from the mountain. They do carry the authority and wisdom of our tradition, which of course is subject to change as life changes.

On the matter of abortion, the Social Principles say:

"Our belief in the sanctity of unborn human life makes us reluctant to approve abortion.

But we are equally bound to respect the sacredness of the life and well-being of the mother and the unborn child" (page 30).

Our United Methodist website (umc.org) goes on to elaborate:

These statements, and others, place the United Methodist position on abortion firmly on the spectrum of life-based ethics rather than choice-based ethics. Life-based ethics place life at the center of guidance regarding situations where there may be conflicts. Life-based ethics call for as much life as possible to be honored and preserved in such situations. Choice-based ethics place the sovereignty of a person's right to choose at the center of such arguments.

United Methodists affirm the sanctity of unborn human life. We similarly understand that the pregnant woman is also a life of sacred worth, and that there are circumstances in which there may be "tragic conflicts of life versus life." This may happen to any pregnant woman, anywhere, at any time during her pregnancy.

Critical to preserving life is ready access to proper medical care. This includes access to medical care that may include abortion when that is the way to preserve **the most life**possible. That is why the Social Principles affirm that "in such cases we support the legal option of abortion under proper medical procedures

by certified medical providers."

Additional official statements of The United Methodist Church express the denomination's life-centered ethics.

- The United Methodist Church does NOT affirm abortion as a means of birth control.
- We also "unconditionally reject" abortion as a means of gender selection or eugenics.
- And we reject late-term abortions except where the mother's life is in danger, or in cases of severe fetal abnormalities incompatible with life.

I appreciate that our church affirms the complexities of life-altering decisions and works toward offering God's grace to all:

While we understand the need for women to have access to safe, legal abortions, we also "mourn and are committed to promoting the diminishment of high abortion rates." We encourage ministries that reduce unintended pregnancies, such as sex education, access to voluntary family planning, contraception, and "initiatives that enhance the quality of life for all women and girls around the globe."

Finally, United Methodists are committed to ministering with those who have had an abortion, providing support and encouragement. Whatever situation led to a decision to abort, there is always much loss, and much need for healing.

Whatever happens next in our country, I hold tightly to the middle ground, with all its hues of gray, grateful that we always swim in God's grace.

Because we only provide the half-hour chapel service one Sunday every other month, changes occur. In March we worshipped in the dining hall, but this month we will be back in the chapel. At 2:00 pm volunteers gather in the chapel on the second floor to receive assignments from Chaplain Michael Tooley and then disperse to escort residents who use wheelchairs. The half-hour service begins at 2:30.

At BD we have the reputation of singing a lot because we begin singing beforehand. By 3:30 pm we have finished returning residents to their rooms. Meals are boxed and sold to those who have placed orders in advance through the website. The money raised goes to the cooks and WNSTL, and the leftover food goes to the immigrant community.


THE GARDEN OF EDEN
