It's What We Do

When the bottom falls out of people's lives through political turmoil, natural, ecological, and civil disaster, The United Methodist Church shows up. We call it UMCOR (United Methodist **Committee on Relief),** and it is *our global emergency relief arm*. UMCOR's work reaches people in more than 80 countries, including our own. UMCOR provides survivors not only temporary relief but long-term education, training, and support.

It's what we do.

In the last 10 years, UMCOR has helped address wide-spread famine in several countries in Africa. As countries such as Bosnia, Syria, and Afghanistan experienced civil strife, UMCOR was there to help affected communities rebuild homes and lives. UMCOR has provided relief to survivors of earthquakes and tropical storms in Haiti and Chile; floods in Pakistan, the tsunami in Japan, and long-term recovery aid to communities in the US South devastated by hurricanes and western states plagued by wildfires. We have been on the ground for the fleeing immigrants of Ukraine and will continue to provide support through the local ministries of the surrounding nations.

UMCOR shows up early and stays late.

It's what we do.

Here is the really cool thing about it: UMCOR sends 100% of donations to the designated cause. When you give a dollar to UMCOR to help someone who has just suffered a disaster, every single penny goes to the emergency where you want to send help. That is not so with the majority of charities, who use a portion (ranging from 5-65%) of donations to fund the business of the organization.

"How can we do that?" you wonder. We do it by taking an annual offering in our churches that covers the administrative costs of operations. For more than 50 years, United Methodist congregations have been taking part in a special UMCOR Sunday, once each year, laying the foundation for UMCOR's ministry of relief and hope. <u>UMCOR does not receive United</u> 2

<u>Methodist World Service or apportionment funds</u>. With this offering, we are able to send 100% when the call for funds is made so we are able to send more healing and hope to some of the most pain-filled places on earth.

We will celebrate UMCOR Sunday this Sunday, March 19th. United Women in Faith in Action—Restoring Hope!



A Dallas nonprofit in Texas offers hope to imprisoned mothers and their daughters. One of the programs of <u>Girls Embracing Mothers</u> gives girls a four-hour weekly visit with their moms, including a meal, art therapy, and an empowering curriculum. At first a girl may be too angry or hurt to talk to her mom, but they soon open up and begin a relationship guiding them toward happier, healthier lives.

Girls Embracing Mothers (GEM) also helps train and prepare incarcerated mothers for re-entry after they're released. <u>Because United Women in Faith's priority has long been to end Mass</u>

Incarceration/Interrupt the School-to- Prison Pipeline, the women's organization has made a \$250,000 grant to GEM.

Not only has the number of incarcerated women increased greatly, but there are 1.7 times more Black women incarcerated as White women. 80% of the women in Texas prisons are mothers. Currently, at least 5 million children in the US have had an incarcerated parent. Studies show children of incarcerated parents are more likely to become incarcerated themselves -- it becomes a cycle because that's what they see and the behaviors they learn. GEM gives the girls a chance to see there are others like them and they are not alone. GEM also provides a re-entry stipend, job training, and other support. There is even a program paying the moms to go to school full time to give them skills and a career. Mothers who lose their children lose hope. GEM gives back hope and enables them to put their family back together.

Over seventy percent of our local UWF budget goes to support missions across the nation and worldwide. Approximately twelve percent of our local budget is used for missions in the St. Louis area.

Call To Action: Stand for Doing No Harm to Transgender Children and Youth

Our church's theology is that our LGBTQ siblings are a holy creation of God. Bills in process in the Missouri legislature intend to limit, if not prevent transgender health care. Medical and mental health organizations support transgender treatment protocols followed with children and youth. Families with their youth have given heart-wrenching testimony on the harm these bills will do. Rep. Ian Mackey stood with them in committee hearings and continues to work against the bills. **We can help.**

Given the super-majority in the House and Senate, Rep. Mackey knows some version of these bills is certain to pass. However, he has reason to believe that **House and Senate leadership of both parties do not favor passage of the bills as voted out of committees. The strategy of** **legislators against the legislation is to amend the bills, so that they say something but do not actually mandate restrictions.** This tactic was successfully used with regard to book-banning bills last year. A 3/11/23 *St. Louis Post-Dispatch* article (A copy is posted on the Social Justice section of the bulletin board in Fellowship Hall.) reports some progress in the Senate. But more change is needed.

Participation in a recent symposium on citizenship at Eden Seminary, reminded me that as Christians we tend to underestimate the power of our voices, especially in relation to justice issues. The result: I am committed to contacting MO House and Senate leaders this week affirming the harm the bills will do and supporting changes that allow for the continuation of transgender treatment of children and youth. I urge you to join me ASAP. Senate debate resumes Monday, March 20th.
