They will be selling TJ's Pizza and Heritage Candles. Members of the





TOPIC: Dismantling Systemic Racism - Racial Covenants in Webster Groves

Trans Justice

Once upon a time...God took the great DNA molecule, perhaps God's greatest creation, and tinkered with it to separate us from the bullfrog and the giraffe. Then God tinkered with it a bit more to distinguish us from each other. Then for reasons known only to God, He tinkered with it to make some of us heterosexual, others of us homosexual, some of us bisexual, others of us transgender, and a few of us androgynous.

Unfortunately, people are not always appreciative of all this diversity, and have reacted with a mixed bag of responses, ranging from warm acceptance to cool tolerance, to disdain and judgment, and some, to unbridled violence. As a consequence, persons not fitting the traditional binary of male/female, are at greater risk of problematic development that, without positive support, disproportionately results in depression, suicidal tendencies, and assault, including homicide.

Our own Methodist tradition has struggled mightily over how to understand our LGBTQIA+ siblings; whether they are a holy creation of God, (the theology embraced by our church), or an aberration to be fixed, or a sin to be confessed. This deeply felt conflict has recently caused our global Methodist connection to fracture, and we are amid the fallout now. Webster United Methodist will stay within the more progressive United Methodist connection, welcoming and honoring our LGBTQIA+ siblings.

This conflict in the religious community is also very real in the political arena. In Missouri, a number of bills would institute an all-out ban on gender-affirming health care for transgender minors, with exceptions for intersex youth. Parallel measures, also filed by conservative Republicans, include a bill to penalize any adult who "coerces" a minor into undergoing gender-affirming care, classifying such coercion as child abuse or neglect, which is a felony. Other proposed legislation would prohibit the use of public funds for gender transition procedures for minors.

These are oppressive and frightening times for families with transgender children. Sunday's Post-Dispatch featured an article about three clergy families of transgendered children, and their concerns for the well-being of their kids as they mature. The article states: "At least 31 bills have been introduced by the Republican supermajority, targeting youth participation in competitive school sports, the ability to revise gender on birth certificates, gender-affirming medical treatments, and other rights of LGBTQ people." For many families with transgender children, the most threatening element of this wave of proposed anti-trans legislation is that it will identify treatments to delay puberty or help transition their child to the child's preferred gender as "child abuse" and invoke criminal penalties for medical providers and possibly parents. If these bills become law, transitioning children in Missouri will have to wait until adulthood before they can interrupt the progression of their gender development, making the physical and social transition more difficult and potentially less successful, as well as, causing irreparable harm as they must stay encased in a body in which they feel like they do not belong.

"Do no harm" is one of the three General Rules of our faith. Forcing children to wait until adulthood before they and their families can seek gender intervention will certainly do harm.

The United Methodist Social Principles remind us that God made all persons unique and that we are beloved. To love God's creation is to work toward its health and wholeness. Under The Nurturing Community, Human Sexuality section of the Social Principles, it says, "All persons, regardless of age, gender, marital status, or sexual orientation, are entitled to have their human and civil rights ensured and to be protected against violence. The Church should support the family in providing ageappropriate education regarding sexuality to children, youth, and adults."

Friends, this is a justice issue, and we can make our voices heard. We encourage you to contact your state legislators (you can look them up at <u>Legislator Lookup</u>) to let them know where you stand on this important, and we believe, egregiously harmful wave of proposed legislation.
