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A message from Pastor Sharon... The Work of Annual Conference 2023

Part of the polity/structure of The United Methodist Church involves organizing the churches geographically by conference. We are part of the Missouri Annual Conference (AC), and Bishop Bob Farr officiates as our conference bishop, meaning he's the top guy (though still much lower than Jesus). The founder of the Methodist movement, John Wesley, thought it useful to gather all the clergy annually for "holy conferencing". Years later, the church lay representatives were added to this connection. So annually, we gather all the active clergy and church lay representatives connect through worship, prayer, reports, and the business of our Annual Conference. Josh Krakos is our AC Lay Representative and is traveling from South Dakota to attend on our behalf.

This year, there are two non-binding resolutions put forth for us to vote on at AC. A nonbinding resolution is a written motion adopted by a deliberative body that cannot progress into a law. This type of resolution is often used to express the body's approval or disapproval of something that they cannot otherwise vote on, due to the matter being handled by another jurisdiction, in this case, the General Conference, who has exclusive authority over all changes to the Book of Discipline. Essentially, these two resolutions are asking the Missouri AC body "Hey, do y'all think this is a good idea or not?"

Here is the essence of the two resolutions we are being asked to consider:

Creation of a U.S. Regional Conference

Some years ago, special Central Conferences were established among many of the countries where United Methodism had spread beyond America, but whose context needed to have some special rules differing from the U.S. Book of Discipline. This resolution in support of creating a U.S. Regional Conference asks us to recognize that the American context is unique as well. This would allow each region to design ministry for its particular contexts. Establishing an American Conference would be especially helpful in terms of issues relating to human sexuality.

Removal of Harmful Language in the Book of Discipline

At the 1972 and 1976 General Conferences, restrictive language was added to our Social Principals that restricted marriage to "only between one man and one woman" and stated that "the UMC does not condone the practice of homosexuality and considers this practice to be incompatible with Christian teaching." Further, currently "self-avowed homosexuals are not to be certified as candidates, ordained as ministers, or appointed to serve in the UMC." The inserts also barred UMC clergy from celebrating the union of same-sex couples, or holding these celebrations in a UMC church, or for any UMC church to give UMC funds to support any LGBTQUIA+ caucus or group. The nonbinding resolution seeks to remove all these exclusionary restrictions.

While both resolutions to be considered by the session are purely aspirational in nature, and neither will by itself result in any change to the Book of Discipline, I am excited to see these questions put before our AC body to voice their position on these two important considerations. That is how large bodies of people holding differing ideas and positions begin to gather energy for change. These same issues will be part of the work of the 2024 General Conference.

Another piece of business will be the official disaffiliation of 75 churches within the Missouri Conference. While this sounds like a terrible number, and certainly every church is important and precious, at last count that is 75 churches out of about 700 in our conference. Some are leaving to join the newly created, more conservative church denomination, Global Methodist Church; some are intending to remain independent, and still others expect to affiliate with other denominations. We pray God's blessing upon them.

What this means is that the churches left under the broad United Methodist tent will largely be those who share more progressive theology on issues of human sexuality and those who may differ in perspective but are willing to share the tent with those who hold a differing point of view on this issue. While we mourn the loss of these sibling churches from our UMC family, it is actually encouraging news for those who are ready to re-establish our denomination as a vital, thriving, multicultural, and diverse church open to all people whom God has created.

Father's Day Photos





Peace With Justice Sunday June 4

This year marks 55 years since the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., who gave his life in pursuit of racial equality and the eradication of poverty. Dr. King was killed in 1968 after showing up in support of a sanitation workers strike in Memphis, Tennessee. Dr. King used nonviolence as a way to make his voice heard in the midst of a culture that was violent toward him. He understood that peace and quiet and true peace were not one and the same; rather he believed "true peace is not merely the absence of tension: it is the presence of justice."



Sunday, June 4th United Methodist Churches will observe Peace with Justice Sunday, one of our six church-wide Special Sundays. That Sunday we will be united in our attention and commitment to striving toward the kind of peace Dr. King pursued with his words and life. On Peace with Justice Sunday, United Methodist Churches will take up an offering to fund programs and projects that echo the very heart and spirit of those who fought peacefully for racial equality during the Civil Rights movement.

Please think prayerfully about a Peace with Justice Sunday gift to support the work of reconciliation that the world is crying out for in the midst of its brokenness. Such gifts allow us to respond to the world with the love of Christ.

Freestyle Pool Passes--what are they and why should we support them?

Founded in 2021, the Freestyle [Pool] Pass program is a joint effort of the Webster Groves School District, the City of Webster Groves, the Alliance for Interracial Dignity, and Webster Rock Hill Ministries.

The Freestyle Pass removes barriers to the community swimming pool by providing free daily swim passes for individuals and families that require financial assistance. Thanks to the generosity of this community, 944 pool passes were used last summer! This program, initiated by the Alliance for Interracial Dignity, is an expression of community healing in response to our local history of discrimination.

For many years, our municipality denied the use of the community swimming pool to African Americans; additionally, for decades after the pool was integrated, policy maintained that non-residents could use the pool only with a resident "sponsor." That policy was rooted in exclusion, and while it was thankfully revised in 2021, Webster Groves hopes to demonstrate accountability for past wrongs by working to expand inclusion to water safety and swim instruction opportunities.

Freestyle Passes depend on private donations, with fundraising taking place every other year. This is a fundraising year. The hope is to expand the Freestyle Pass program to include a limited number of scholarships providing free water safety and swim classes to those who have a financial barrier to participating. The fundraising goal is \$8,500 for pool passes, with funds raised above and beyond that to be dedicated to "Gordon Grants," swim instruction scholarships named for Benny Gordon, Jr. Benny Gordon, an African American, was the lead activist who worked to integrate the Webster pool in the 1950's. He did so not knowing how to swim.
