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A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Hot!!!

As I write this, much of our country is under extraordinary heat alerts, setting new record high temperatures every day. This week, it seems we are getting a bit of a reprieve in St. Louis, but the following two weeks promise to be real scorchers. This is the kind of weather that turns our yards brown and crunchy, and drives us inside to air-conditioned spaces. It's also the kind of weather that kills.

Did you know that in the US in 2022, according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, there were 67,512 emergency department visits due to heat, 9235 persons hospitalized due to heat exposure, and 702 people who from died of heat-related causes? What makes this statistic so frustrating is that 100% of all these crises were preventable. Many are the elderly, wrapped in sweaters because their internal thermometers have gone a little wacky, or who are trying to "do without" AC because of the cost to their electric bill.

Then there's the un-countable death toll on animals left in enclosures. People don't like to report this because they feel like dopes for doing it, so it's difficult to get a solid stat. The temperature inside of a closed car can rise to deathly level in just minutes after the car is turned off. To leave an animal or a human enclosed in a car on a hot day is like shoving them into the oven. It's unthinkable, but people do it. They figure it will only take them a minute to complete their errand.

Summer heat is here with a vengeance. As Christians, and as human beings, when the heat cranks up, we need to be especially mindful of the well-being of others. Time to check on your neighbor living alone. Maybe walk over and visit in person. When the door opens, does the air that spills out feel cool? Is your neighbor wrapped in 3 layers of clothes? Is their speech slurred or confused? If so, it's time to get help. Walking through the parking lot as you head for the store, if you see a child or dog in a closed car, call 911. Don't worry about making a big fuss; just do it. Death by heat exposure is horrible. You can save a life by your quick action. Stand by the car until the authorities arrive. Then your part is done. They will deal with the owner of the car, who is sure to be defensive about their choice.

By being vigilant and proactive, even though it may feel intrusive, you are "loving your neighbor", and may very well save their life.

If your job requires you to work in this weather, I hope you will take frequent breaks in the shade and stay hydrated. Wear a hat, and drape towels dipped in ice water around your neck to keep your core temperature stable. Think about the Arctic tundra. May God be with you.
