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A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

During the first few weeks of January, there seems to be all kinds of talk about how we may want to spend our time in this new year. There's lots of publicity for cruising, joining a gym, and signing up for college classes online. Time is an elusive thing: it is fleeting, but it can also drag. Time marches on, though it sometimes seems to fly. Time is a precious commodity, and it is an important part of the currency of our lives. How we dole out our time says something about what matters to us, and into what (or whom) we are willing to invest.

One of my favorite illustrations about spending time involves a container, like a big vase, and a pile of rocks of different sizes. The container represents our 24-hour day. The rocks represent ways that we can spend our time in that 24-hour day.

The exercise begins by asking, 'What are the most important things you want to be sure of and get into your 24 hours?" These are the absolutes, those that above all things, you want to attend to first because to exclude or forget one would be a loss too costly to bear. These big things are represented by big rocks. Here's the first thing that became obvious: you cannot fit that many big rocks into one 24-hour timeframe.

When I did this for myself, I could fit in four. They were my relationship with God, my relationship with others, my health, and my ministry. Take a minute right here and think about what your big rocks might be.

Next, think about other items that need to fit in somewhere in our day. Medium rocks represent cleaning, reading, playing, running errands, doing some research, taking the dog for a walk, calling my brother, having coffee with a friend, paying some bills, delivering the car for an oil change. But what about the gallon of milk or the tank of gas you have to stop by on your way home? The haircut for the kids, the emergency load of laundry, two dozen cookies your son needs for tomorrow, the late-night chat with your teenager that presents itself? For those activities, we will pour in a bunch of smaller pebbles that trickled down into all the little gaps.

Here's another thing that became obvious: If we wait until the end of our demonstration to put in our big rocks, they will never fit. We've got to assign priority to the things that are most important to us and place them first. Otherwise, the smaller demands on our time will fill in all the gaps and something extraordinarily precious to us just won't fit into the space that is left.

As Christ-followers, I hope you will plan to choose to nurture your relationship with God as one of your big rocks. How that looks is up to you. Reading a devotional, praying, meditating on scripture, attending worship, and joining a small group are some of the ways that we can draw closer to our Lord. I believe if we make sure God gets into our day first, all the other rocks of our lives will find their place.

Why does the United Methodist Church have 6 Special Offering Sundays each year? The Book of Discipline explains, "The special Sundays...I (are) intended to illustrate the nature and calling of the church..." "(They) are placed on the calendar to make clear the calling of the church as the people of God, and to give persons the opportunity to contribute offerings to special programs."

Sunday, January 14, the Sunday before the observance of Dr. Martin Luther King Junior's birthday, is designated as "Human Relations Day." This offering supports Community Developers, United Methodist Voluntary Service, and Youth Offender Rehabilitation programs. An example of such a program is the story of "Donna," an active participant at Solomon Community Temple UMC in Milwaukee, WI, who became pregnant as a teen. She received help from a Christ-centered ministry called Blanket of Love which works to improve birth outcomes of African American babies by teaching prenatal care, infant care, and parenting skills to young pregnant African American women and their families.


