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
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BISHOP'S STATEMENT ON KANSAS CITY SHOOTING

FEBRUARY 15, 2024

What should have been a day of celebration became a nightmare when shooters opened fire on the crowds gathered yesterday at the Chiefs Kingdom Champion Parade near Union Station in downtown Kansas City.

I invite you to join me in praying for the victim who died, and the other spectators who were injured in the attack. Our hearts go out to the family members who are grieving and all who are reeling from the violence. We are grateful for law enforcement and other first responders who acted quickly, aided the wounded and helped those fleeing the scene to seek safety.

I refuse to accept that mass shootings are "normative." Just because something is, doesn't mean it should be. Violence of any kind disrupts the peace God wants for all his people. And as United Methodists we embrace a gospel that believes we have been filled with a power to do great things (Jn. 14:12). As people who practice our faith, I urge you to act. Yesterday also marked the beginning of the season of Lent. It's a season that asks us to do the seemingly impossible — to find quiet in a world full of noise, to repent in a world bent on pointing the finger, to practice self-sacrifice in a world quick to shirk responsibility and to fast in a world obsessed with feeding every desire. As United Methodists, I wonder if we might do the seemingly impossible through the power of the Holy Spirit when it comes to addressing the gun violence raging in our communities?

Our Office of Mission, Service and Justice has compiled resources for you and your congregations to demonstrate that we believe in the power of God working in our midst. May we open ourselves to power of God at work within us and do whatever we can to alter the current course of this behavior once and for all.

News of yet another mass shooting can make us cynical, throwing up our hands that nothing can be done. Such tragedies can make us doubt God's power and question God's mercy. We point to the shadows cast by violence in our world as proof that God is not working in the world. But I am convinced that nothing can separate us from God's love (Rom. 8). If God is with us, then God is with us even in those times and places where it seems that death and darkness have prevailed.

Light of the world, have mercy on us. Guide us in the way of peace. In Christ.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

THOMAS HARRIS
(1912-2000) (1915-1999)

A PASSION FOR CHINA AND SARAWAK

THOMAS AND JENNIE HARRIS WERE
COMMISSIONED IN 1947 AND FIRST ASSIGNED
TO SERVE AS TEACHERS IN NANPING, CHINA.
BUT WITHIN A FEW YEARS, THEY, AND MANY
OTHER MISSIONARIES, HAD TO LEAVE CHINA
BECAUSE OF POLITICAL UNREST. IN 1951.

THEY WERE APPOINTED TO SERVE IN SARAWAK, THE MALAYSIAN SIDE OF THE ISLAND OF BORNEO. ALTHOUGH A LARGE CHINA EX-PAT METHODIST COMMUNITY RESIDED IN SARAWAK, THE HARRIS FAMILY WAS SENT UP THE BANYAO RIVER TO NANGA MUJONG, WHERE THE DAYAK SEA PEOPLE MADE THEIR HOMES IN GREAT LONG HOUSES. THE DAYAK, ALSO CALLED THE IBAN, ARE THE LARGEST INDIGENOUS GROUP IN SARAWAK. THEIR LONGHOUSE RESIDENCES COULD ACCOMMODATE AS MANY AS 25 FAMILIES, ALL LIVING AND WORKING COMMUNALLY.

THE HARRIS COUPLE EFFECTIVELY BECAME THE MISSION SUPERINTENDENTS OF THE IBAN WORK, BUILDING A RESIDENCE, A SCHOOL, A CLINIC AND AN AGRICULTURAL CENTER IN NANGA MUJONG. THEY WERE WELL ACCEPTED AND RESPECTED BY THE INDIGENOUS COMMUNITY AND DID MUCH TO IMPROVE THEIR HEALTH, AGRICULTURAL PRACTICE AND ACCEPTANCE INTO THE METHODIST MISSION. THEY RETURNED TO THE U.S. IN 1970.


THIS EXCERPT OF A DECEMBER 1966 MISSIONARY LETTER FROM THOMAS SHOWS THE SEAMLESS WAY THEY INTEGRATED THEIR WORK IN AGRICULTURE, EDUCATION AND SPIRITUAL LEADERSHIP. "THE USUAL 'DRY SEASON' OF AUGUST HAS BROUGHT HEAVY RAINS, SWOLLEN RIVERS, AND DELAYED PLANTING OF RICE! THOUGH A HOPEFUL CHANGE WILL COME IN THIS MONTH, IT IS LIKELY THAT THE DELAYED RICE CROP WILL CATCH THE SHATTERING RAINS OF NOVEMBER-DECEMBER WHEN IN BLOOM. WITH CROPS TO BE GROWN AND HUNGER LESSENED; SOULS TO BE CLAIMED AND NURTURED; AND THE MINDS OF YOUNG AND OLD ALIKE CAPTURED BY THE THRILLING NEW EXPERIENCES OF LEARNING, WE WILL FIND PLENTY TO DO THAT WILL NEED YOUR PRAYERFUL SUPPORT."

Recruitment continues for this year's mission work week at Midwest Mission near Springfield, IL., and we hope some new people will join us this year! The dates are Monday, May 13th - Thursday, May 16th 2024.

Lodging in the spacious dormitory building is both convenient and comfortable; we are just a short walking distance from our daily work site building. Work shifts have morning and afternoon breaks as well as a long lunch break, and the day is over between 3:30 and 4:00PM. Serving others while working beside fellow volunteers from all over the Midwest is definitely a break from routine, but also quite enriching.

*What is Midwest Mission? It is a United Methodist-affiliated disaster relief facility providing disaster relief kits, school desks, educational & medical supplies, etc., locally, nationally, and internationally.

* The work: There is something for every ability—packing kits, sewing school bags, building &refinishing school desks, repairing bicycles and sewing machines, organizing materials, unloading items, filling shipping containers, etc.

*Cost: will be determined based on number of people going, but it will be quite reasonable for dormitory lodging and supplies, plus food & gas expenses. Scholarships are available if needed.

CLIMATE CHANGE - PART 2 REASONS FOR OPTIMISM?



In this second piece on Climate Change I focus on recycling of plastic materials where individuals, corporations and governments each have a role to play.

Petroleum based polymers (plastics) require high levels of energy in their manufacture, and these materials, unless captured and recycled, create major environmental damage, most notably in the oceans. Plastic recycling is an issue that needs major improvements. There are a number of companies in the field and a variety of methods in use or under development. A number of major companies are investing in large plants as they see this as a growth opportunity. Some of the methods have little if any impact on climate change, although having positive impact on the environment, while others show significant potential impact. For example, pyrolysis (heating at high temperatures) produces liquids that can be used as fuels but requires much energy for heating. Similarly, melting and reforming plastics provides some useful products but also uses much energy. More environmentally friendly are methods to convert the plastics back to their original components. These can be used to make new plastic materials reducing the need for petroleum-based raw materials. For several years biodegradable polymers (plastics) have been commercially available. These materials have found a limited market. For many uses the properties do not match those of petrochemically derived materials and their biodegradation is slow. Biodegradation actually yields CO. The lack of infrastructure is a major factor that inhibits the potential amount of plastic recycled.

An alternative approach to plastic recycling is legislative action to reduce plastic use. Legislation in the EU now bans single use plastic items, such as cutlery, plates and straws. Reduced use of food containers and other products from expanded polystyrene (Styrofoam) is also part of the legislation. We as individuals can follow these mandates. Responding to the Justice team questionnaire is an aid to reminding us how we as individuals are doing.
