I wanted to return to the "new thing" I announced at the end of service Sunday, in case it took you by surprise, or for those of you who may not have had the chance to hear it.

When I began on the clergy track in the UMC, I was fully intending to be a deacon. I continue to see a lot of fruit from leading small groups in the UMC (more to come on that later). But within the first few months of beginning down this path, as I was helping launch a new church in the Carondelet area of St Louis (The Connection) the pastor asked me if I'd be willing to help her with Communion each week. INVITATION TO PROTECT THE BIRDS AS THEY MIGRATE



Webster Groves Presbyterian Church's Environmental Stewardship committee invites us to join them in taking individual action to benefit the birds.

Every year, billions of birds migrate north in the spring and south in the fall. The majority of the birds fly at night, navigating using the moon, stars, and night sky. As they pass over cities, they can become disoriented by bright lights and sky glow causing them to waste valuable energy, often trapping them in a circle until dawn. An estimated 600 million birds in the U.S. die each year from collisions with buildings.

St. Louis, situated along a key flyway for migrating birds, ranks as the fifth most dangerous city for birds during spring migration according to a study published by <u>Cornell Lab of Ornithology</u>. Many area organizations work with <u>Lights Out Heartland to coordinate efforts to protect birds</u>. You can learn more at https://lightsoutheartland.org.

Please consider following the guidelines from <u>Lights Out Heartland</u> for bird-safe lighting during the upcoming September migration:

- When possible, turn both interior and exterior lights off by 11:00 p.m., especially during spring (May) and fall (Sept) migration periods.
- When possible, close interior blinds to protect migrating birds from indoor lighting that must remain on at night.
- Use automatic lighting controls (timers and motion detectors).
- Eliminate/reduce any direct upward exterior lighting. Ensure that all exterior light fixtures are shielded (downward light only).
- Utilize minimum wattage fixtures.
- Avoid floodlights, spotlights, or searchlights. When this cannot be avoided, turn off such lighting during spring and fall migrations.

Kyle Horton, a Rose postdoctoral fellow at the Cornell Lab of Ornithology states, "It's a large-scale issue but acting even at the very local scale to reduce lighting can make a difference".

We hope you will consider this opportunity to protect the birds God created.


