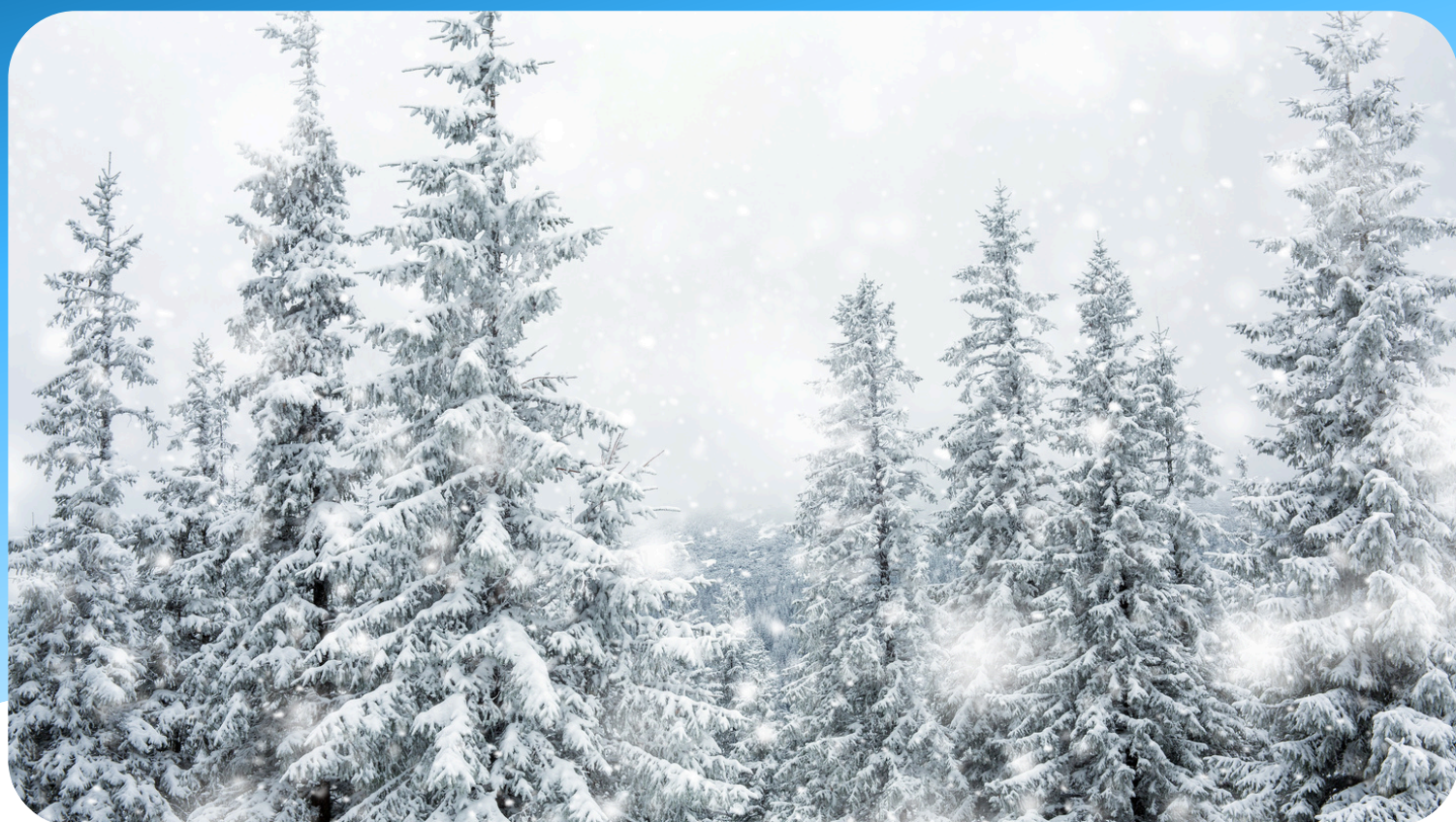

Mini Greenhouses for Native Seedlings: A Workshop at *The Mountain Service* January 16, 2025 at 7:30pm

Would you like to get a head start on growing native plants for the spring? The Justice Team has planned a great opportunity for you as part of its initiatives for Creation Care. Planting native plants is an easy, beautiful, and important way to contribute to the care of God's wonderful creation. Many native plants are perennials, which means they will grow back for at least several years and sometimes many years. Native plants grow well in the areas where they are native. Once established, they require little or no watering, and no more fertilizer than the nutrients that leaf mulch adds to the soil as it decomposes. These characteristics make gardening with native plants economical and relatively easy.

One aspect of gardening with native plants that can be somewhat expensive is purchasing plants. That's where growing plants from seeds comes in! Seeds for native plants are available free from friends who garden with native plants and from the St. Louis Native Plants group on Facebook. Purchasing seeds is also inexpensive. A great source of native plants and seeds is the Missouri Wildflowers Nursery, <https://mowildflowers.net/>. They carry only plants native to the state of Missouri, and they ship plants and seeds anywhere in the U.S. You can also order plants and seeds from Missouri Wildflowers for free delivery to the Kirkwood Farmers Market during the spring and fall.

Many seeds for native plants need cold stratification to germinate, which means they need to be planted in the late fall or early winter to get moisture from snow and rain and to experience repeated changes in temperature, freezing and thawing several times before the warm weather of spring. This is where milk jug greenhouses come in! A translucent milk jug (not solid white plastic) or other clear plastic container makes an economical and efficient greenhouse environment for native seeds. Set outside during the winter months, the seeds will cold stratify, so they will be ready to germinate in the spring. Once the seedlings are large enough, you can plant them in your yard or in containers to grow into lovely plants that will provide food and shelter for native bugs and birds and for migrating birds and butterflies.

Hopefully you are intrigued and beginning to get excited about planting native seeds in milk jugs! Please join us for a workshop in fellowship hall at 7:30 pm on Thursday, January 16. This is one of the Mountain Service small group sessions and everyone is welcome! We will have native seeds, potting soil, duct tape, utility knives, tools to make drainage holes, containers for watering, permanent markers, and some milk jugs—all the supplies needed to make mini-greenhouses. If you have any of these supplies—especially milk jugs—please bring them! If you don't have supplies, we will share. If you want to plant a particular native species, you can order your choice of seeds from Missouri Wildflowers at the link above. If you're not fussy, you can use native seeds from Jan Hanson's garden in Webster Groves.
