

If you are interested, please join us. Books are available online or at the Webster Groves Public Library.


We will take a break from Screwtape to join the Lenten study in Fellowship Hall, March 9 - April 13.

# More From The Safety Committee

As we get closer to spring(thankfully), flu season is doing something a bit unusual. Normally, flu peaks earlier in the winter and then declines. This year, however, we are having a second peak right now, and we're seeing a rise in infections and hospitalizations. The CDC estimates there have been about 13,000 deaths from influenza this season.

There are a number of steps we can take to decrease the impact of this increase in flu cases. It's not too late to get a flu shot if you haven't already done so. No need for a second vaccination if you have already gotten one. Stay at home if you have symptoms that you could pass onto others. Wash your hands with soap and water frequently during the day, especially after you get home from trips outside home. Wear a mask if you want added protection. Hydrate well. Adequate fluids can help with symptoms.

Let's help decrease the spread of flu and other viral illnesses by doing what we can to protect each other.

The Fairview doors are to be used as an emergency exit only, not for entering or normal exiting. Recently, the doors were found to be unlatched. Please do not use these doors for ANYTHING other than an emergency exit. The doors do not latch correctly and have to be pushed from the outside in order to shut correctly.

This is a safety issue. If these doors are open, even though this exit has camera monitors, unwanted "guests" could gain entry. Also, proximity to the nursery has to be considered.
