Matthew 6:34 nrsvue

34 "So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today.

Greetings, siblings in Christ!

I want to take a brief moment to look at the Connection Card we started using this year. I've told you all that changes are always ongoing processes, which means the current iteration of what you see on Sunday mornings may not always look the way it does now. I also want to sincerely thank all of you who have shared your thoughts and feedback on it. That said, understand that we are listing the corporate responses (call to worship and opening prayer) so that all attendees can see those, regardless of vision or seating.

I mentioned on January 12th, that I was not going to include an Order of the service to the congregation. I am aware this has been a shift for everyone, and I hope you know my heart well enough to know that this is not about power or control. My theological reasons for it are best explained by Jesus' statement above. We spend so much of our time and our lives preparing for what's next-worrying about dinner tonight, or upcoming events in our week, or important future dates on our calendars-that I want worship to be a time where you can lay that mindset aside and just abide in the Presence of the Living God. Know that those who have agreed to help lead worship for that Sunday will be prepared and aware of what's next. If you are not leading that week, you can just bring your full presence and awareness into the moment and worship the Lord.

If you know someone in your life who might be interested or challenged by our series, where next Sunday we'll look at how much control the government and culture should have over us as People of God, invite them to join you this Sunday. It is sure to be a challenging topic for all of us.

*What is Midwest Mission? It is a United Methodist-affiliated disaster relief facility providing disaster relief kits, school desks, educational & medical supplies, etc., locally, nationally, and internationally.

* What work will we do? There is something for every ability—-packing kits, sewing school bags, building & refinishing school desks, repairing bicycles and sewing machines, organizing materials, unloading items, filling shipping containers, etc.(sitdown jobs are always available).

*Where do we stay? The dormitory has multiple 2-4 person bedrooms (we use only lower bunks, 2 to a room) as well as a spacious living room/dining area and a large, well-equipped kitchen.

*Cost: will be determined based on number of people going, but it will be minimal for dormitory lodging and supplies, plus food & gas expenses. Financial aid can be available if needed.

Since we are in the middle of flu season, I'd like to remind the members of the congregation of simple steps that we all can take to keep us safe during this time of year. Flu A and B, Covid and RSV are all on the upswing and we need to do our part to protect our members.

First, and most important, if you have fever, cough, respiratory illness, feeling fatigue or just not feeling well, stay at home until the symptoms have passed. It's way too easy to pass these illnesses on to others. Wash your hands often and try to avoid touching your face so you don't infect yourself with something you picked up when you were out. You can also use alcohol-based hand cleaners to do this. However, these types of cleaners do not work well against the spread of Norovirus, which is a fast spreading stomach virus. This virus requires hand washing for 20 seconds with warm water and soap. If you feel the need for additional protection, wear a mask when you are out and around others. Masking is effective in preventing the spread of respiratory illnesses.

Let's all take a few steps to guard the health and well being of ourselves, family members and members of WUM.
